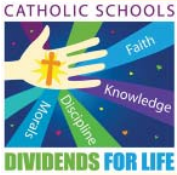

Catholic Schools Week, a joint project of the National Catholic Education Association and the U.S. Conference of Bishops, will be celebrated at Carmel this year from January 25 until January 29th. It is a national event that applauds Catholic schools for their excellence in promoting communities of faith, centers for academic achievement, and programs that develop leadership and personal responsibility. The theme for this year is "Catholic Schools – Morals, Discipline, Knowledge, Faith – Dividends for Life".

In addition to the speaker, students have opportunities to participate in small group activities, various workshops such as sports and team building, stress management, improvisations, etc. Students will be served breakfast, lunch and dinner. In the evening they will attend a dance with a DJ. A tee shirt will be given to each registrant as a reminder of this day.

### ACT Practice Exam



Wondering how your sophomore or junior will do on the ACT? Would you like them to have a practice session to see how much they really know? Carmel Catholic is offering a Mock ACT exam for sophomores and juniors on Saturday, January 9, 2010 from 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. in the student lounge. Students must pre-register by going to [www.revolutionprep.com](http://www.revolutionprep.com) in advance. Students must bring a photo ID and pencils as well as an approved calculator to the testing session.

While the score received will not be a valid score that can be forwarded to future colleges, this score will help students know areas of strength and areas for more study. A follow-up meeting for parents and students will be held on Wednesday, January 27, 2010 at 7:00 PM in the Auditorium to discuss the exam results and receive information about all of the different ways a student can prepare for the ACT/SAT college entrance exams.

### College Search Information



Juniors and parents are encouraged to attend the "Making Your College Search Count" presentation on Tuesday, January 12, 2010 at 7 p.m. in the auditorium. This is an interesting presentation that will outline basic information on how to find the right match for your student.

Another parent meeting will be held for Juniors parents on Thursday, February 18, 2010. Parents are advised to mark their calendars to hear presenters Jerry Pope and Ron Weimer give "insider" information on how to navigate the college search and application process from the viewpoint of the colleges. While this presentation is geared toward juniors, all parents and grade levels are welcome to attend.

## Carmel Catholic Students Team Up With Catholic Charities To Help Those Less Fortunate

In the spirit of the season, Carmel Catholic High School students and faculty teamed up with Catholic Charities to participate in the charity's annual Christmas gift giving program for less fortunate families and individuals throughout Lake County. Carmel has participated in this charitable program for over 26 years.

The entire student body plus faculty signed up to purchase gifts for families and individuals. The program is coordinated by the Registrar's Office and carried out in each homeroom. Each of Carmel Catholic's 56 homerooms was assigned a family and in some cases homerooms also "adopted" individuals in need or people with special needs.



Catholic Charities identifies and screens the individuals and families who request help and then generates a "wish list" for the school. Carmel students collect money in their homerooms and a few students are selected as designated shoppers. Gifts are purchased and then wrapped so gift recipients can enjoy the complete Christmas gift giving experience. 179 people comprising of forty-four families plus 60 individuals received Christmas gifts and holiday cheer from Carmel this year.

"Our students love this project and they seem to appreciate the fact that they have helped someone by their efforts. We have noticed over the years that once the students see what they have accomplished they feel grateful for the opportunity to help. Some people ask for basic necessities on their Christmas wish lists and this is always a sobering experience for our students when they realize the struggles some people endure," explains Sister Mary Sattgast, BVM, Registrar and Co-coordinator of Carmel's Catholic Charities gift-giving program.

"Our annual Christmas Family Project is one way of acting on our Christian responsibility to care for those in need. As an educational community, it is important for us to provide opportunities for our students to follow through on that responsibility so that when they move into the world they continue to give of themselves to those in need," explains Lynne Strutzel, Principal.

Carmel Catholic High School acknowledges the Registrar's Office—Sister Mary Sattgast, BVM and Rita Markham, Assistant Registrar—plus all of the Homeroom teachers for ensuring the success of the Christmas family project.

## Carmel Catholic Students Participate In Violence Awareness and Action Day

Carmel Catholic High School's Chicago History and Culture Class, under the direction of Social Studies Faculty Member, Sharon Smogor, is participating in a nationwide pilot program called, the Civic Action Project, (CAP) along with over 50 other high schools nationwide.

As part of their involvement with the CAP project, the class recently visited Maria High School in Chicago to participate in a Violence Awareness and Action Day. Students from Hales Franciscan High School in Chicago also participated in the program. The day's main event was an anti-violence presentation by members of the community organizations Southwest Organizing Project (S.W.O.P.) and CeaseFire. The students discussed the issue of violence in our world, ways to increase awareness of this pervasive issue, and how to develop a collaborative civic action project oriented around what teens can do to prevent violence.

"This was a very interesting experience for me. I learned that no one person can change something alone. It takes a community effort, but each and every person involved has an influence and change can happen," explains Carmel senior, Andrew Adamson.

"Effective citizenship takes knowledge of the situation, empathy and understanding of the situation, and action to get the resources to address the problems. Some people choose to close their eyes to the violence in Chicago because they think it does not apply to them. This is very wrong. If more people were more aware of the violence, maybe more would be done to stop the problem," said Carmel junior, Nicole Drechsel.

Carmel students in the Chicago History and Culture Class selected the topic of "Violence In Schools" as their civic action project. The first set of civic actions included the study of historic violent events in Chicago, current acts of violence in the Chicago schools and neighborhoods, research on causes and effects of violence, and national, state and local government policies designed to reduce violence.

The class' participation in Violence Awareness and Action Day at Maria High School will spur continued and more in-depth discussion on the topic of violence and students will be asked to initiate follow-up civic actions and write personal reflections on their experience.

"The students brought their new ideas back to school and are now in the process of writing letters to the Governor asking for support for programs like CeaseFire and SWOP. The CAP students have visited some of the Government classes to ask their fellow students for help in the letter writing campaign. Also, they have spoken to Carmel's Senior Leadership Team to ask them to alert students that money from suburban drug users and dealers goes back to the gangs in the urban areas and this fuels the fires of violence," Mrs. Smogor explains.

CAP consists of a series of 14 policy-related lessons connected to the civic action process. Through the readings and interactive classroom activities contained in the lessons, students learn how government content applies to policymaking at the local level, how policy is made and can be influenced, and strategies for effective citizenship.

The overarching goal of CAP is to help students prepare to be informed and engaged citizens. Students are assessed on their ability to use critical thinking and problem-solving skills.

## Carmel Catholic Marching Band Performs At Outback Bowl

Members of Carmel Catholic High School's marching band recently participated in the Outback Bowl in Tampa, Florida during half-time on New Year's Day. 56 Carmel students, 12 adult leaders, and 4 bus drivers took part in this band excursion to Florida. Carmel Catholic students joined other high school and college band programs from across the country and performed during half-time of this nationally televised bowl game, in which several Carmel Catholic students were showcased!

The Carmel Catholic Marching Band performed with more than 1,000 other band students, 200 flag students and 300 dance team members from across the country.

The collective group practiced for just one four-hour rehearsal and a one-hour dress rehearsal prior to the game. They performed three songs during the half-time spectacular. Country superstar, Tim McGraw was on hand to promote his new tour with sponsor, Outback Steak House. He commended all U.S. Troops for their contributions and sacrifices.

Another trip highlight featured the Carmel Jazz Combo competing in a jazz competition. Five high school groups competed in the "Stage Category." Carmel Catholic's Jazz Combo achieved a "Gold Rating" earning a score of 91 out of 100. They also took home a "Grand Champion" trophy for the "Stage Category" as they were the highest scoring group. Natalie Masini won "Outstanding Soloist" award and Natalie was the only student who earned this award in the "Stage Category."

Additionally, Carmel band members participated in Walt Disney World's Y.E.P. program. (Youth Education Program) as "Keepers of the Animal Kingdom." The group met many different professionals who collectively keep Disney's Animal Kingdom operating. Students were given the opportunity to visit the "Back Lot" where the animals are kept at night, the Nutrition Center, and veterinary areas. The program's objective is to inspire active participation in the protection and preservation of wildlife and wild places. Students learned how this innovative area of Zoology Science is changing the quality of life for animals.

"I am filled with joy that we could provide our students with such a great enrichment activity like the Outback Bowl. The trip took an immense amount of prep work and all of our efforts paid off. ## Carmel Mathematics Students Active In National Mathfax Competition

For the past ten years and counting, Carmel Catholic High School has participated in Mathfax - a national math competition that was started in 1997 and currently serves hundreds of schools. The contest is specifically designed to help students strengthen their test-taking skills enabling them to perform better on their college entrance exams. The competition consists of four tests taken throughout the year. Each test is 30 minutes in length and has 25 questions.



When Mathfax was founded in the fall of 1996, only 20 schools were involved. The contest has since grown to approximately 1300 schools nationwide. Students compete in both the honors level and non-honors level with other schools in the nation. Students from Catholic, private and public schools compete with one another via the Internet. The math contests are held in November, December, February, and March.

The sum of the scores of the top three Carmel students in each category was sent to Mathfax, for competition with thousands of other students across the country. The cumulative scores determine the winners. Two more Mathfax rounds will be held in February and March.

Overall Mathfax winners will be announced in April. Winners receive certificates, plaques and trophies, plus the prestige of winning a national math competition.

"About 85 Carmel students participate in this math competition annually and it is academically beneficial to all of them," explains Carmel Mathematics Department Chair, Ann Petraitis. "Irregardless of the outcome, students can request a copy of the test and an answer log with detailed explanations. This follow-up study is very helpful to them as they prepare for the next round of competitions and their looming ACT and SAT exams. Carmel Catholic is proud to be a participating school in this national and academically challenging test."

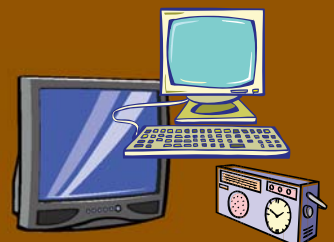

## 96 Carmel Catholic Seniors Named “Illinois State Scholar”

The Illinois Student Assistance Commission (ISAC) has announced the names of the students honored as 2010 Illinois State Scholars throughout the state. The Illinois State Scholar program recognizes Illinois high school students for outstanding academic achievement. The Commission is pleased to announce that 96 seniors from Carmel Catholic High School have been named Illinois State Scholars.

“These students are the academic blue chippers of the Class of 2010,” said ISAC Executive Director Larry Matejka, whose agency has overseen the Illinois State Scholars program since 1958. “Illinois State Scholars are among the best and the brightest in our state’s high schools, and we salute them, their families, and their teachers for this outstanding achievement.”

Students ranking in the top ten percent of the state’s high school graduating seniors have been named “State Scholars.” Rankings are based on a combination of ACT and/or SAT I test score results and class rank at the end of the junior year of high school unless the students achieved a score at or above the 95th percentile for Illinois students on one of the standardized testes.

While the program does not provide a monetary award, the designation as a State Scholar can be listed on applications for college admission and scholarships. High school guidance counselors work in conjunction with ISAC to determine the winners. At least a half million Illinois State Scholars have been recognized in the past 48 years.
